

Greetings precious saints of God in the Christian Church (DOC) in Georgia. The Regional Board has been very busy since our last Regional Assembly in 2022. As you know, we entered a significant season of transition during this time frame, and your Regional Board most definitely rose to the occasion, providing enhanced leadership, direction, and communication with our clergy, congregations, and communities. We discovered talents, skills, and abilities we may not have been previously aware of. We experienced God's promise that God will supply all of our needs in accordance with God's riches in Christ Jesus. (Phil 4:19)

MISSION

The Regional Board shall govern the continuing work and witness of the Regional Church. It shall supervise the business, program, and policies approved by the Regional Assembly, operating under policies and guidelines approved by the Regional Assembly. Rules of procedure for conducting Regional Assembly business shall be approved by the Regional Board.

ACTIVITIES 2023

- At the Quarterly Board Meeting in February, the Board voted and approved the Secretary
 of the Board and additional at-large board members. The Board also voted to suspend
 the job search for a Youth and Family Minister and return to a contracted position for
 leadership of the Regional Youth Assembly. The Board rebooted Priority Work Groups to
 assist with priority tasks identified by the Board.
- Executive Committee vetted an invitation from the General Church to participate in the Church Narrative Project; the proposal was to join a movement in the Disciples of Christ to develop a new narrative for a shared future. We developed a letter to introduce clergy to the project and determine interest, had conversations with other regions that had already done the initial stages of the project, and had conversations with Rev Gilmore, Vice President and Chief of Staff for the Office of the General Minister and President.
- At a Called Board meeting in April, the Board voted and approved to receive the invitation to participate in the Church Narrative Project; later decided to postpone participation until the Regional Assembly in 2024.
- Executive Committee participated in a conflict resolution process regarding staff and volunteers' concerns. This process continues in 2024.
- At a Quarterly Board meeting, the board received Rev. Dr. Denise Bell's resignation from the Regional Minister position to accept a position at Lexington Theological Seminary.
- Moderator Rev. Sheila Hunter retired from FCC Watkinsville and moved to Minnesota. Rev. Donna Gunter, Vice Moderator became Acting Moderator.
- Executive Committee, along with staff and Past Moderator Sheila Hunter, developed a transitional plan and garnered all their skills, abilities, and training as they assumed all the administrative responsibilities of the Regional Minister while working with Rev. Pamela Holt with the College of Regional Ministers to get a temporary Regional Minister to assist with the Search and Call process for churches looking for new pastors and receiving clergy into the Region. Rev Bill Spangler-Dunning, Regional Minister for the Virginia Region, agreed to help.

- Executive Committee began meeting twice a month to ensure that all functions and tasks were met in a timely manner.
- At a Called Board meeting in August, the Executive Committee presented the transitional plan to the Board to solicit their assistance and update them on Interim Regional Minister search.
- Executive Committee developed a position description for an Interim Regional Minister search in consultation with Rev. Pamela Holt with the College of Regional Ministers; received candidates from the College of Regional Ministers and other interested parties; and then conducted interviews and selected a candidate.
- The Executive Committee worked collaboratively, playing off each other's giftedness and
 using their problem-solving skills to provide leadership to the staff and Chairs of the
 Commissions; including writing bi-monthly lead articles for the Good News, providing
 obituaries, and responding to church celebrations and concerns.

Various members of the Board and some Commission Chairpersons also stepped up to take on assignments as needed. Kudos to staff (Rev. Kyle Ermoian for taking on the various clergy offerings led by Rev. Bell and representing the Region when needed; Rev. Lainie Jenkins for representing the Region at a few churches special moments; Ms. Ja'Lisa Jarvis, Administrative Assistant, for maintaining a presence at the Regional Office and keeping the Executive Committee abreast of things coming to the office; and Mrs. Amanda Hale-Uphoff and Rev. Kathy McDowell for helping the Executive Committee fashion and fine-tune our communication to the Region). Rev. Will Johnson, Board Treasurer, also assisted in maintaining presence at the Regional Office and troubleshooting activities that could only be handled in Macon.

- Executive Committee along with Past Moderator Rev. Sheila Hunter interviewed, selected, and developed the contract with a trio of young adults who decided they wanted to be a unit as the contractors for the Youth Assembly.
- At the Quarterly Board meeting in September, the Board voted to receive candidate Rev. Joan Bell-Haynes. The Executive Committee developed the contract.
- At the Quarterly Board Meeting in November, the Board met our new Interim Regional Minister in person and voted to approve CCINGA operating budget for 2024 as submitted by Rev. Will Johnson, Treasurer.
- Various Board members volunteered to work on the Regional Assembly Planning Committee, chaired by Paula Robin, Moderator-Elect, and the Nominating Committee, chaired by Rev. Donna Gunter, Acting Moderator.
- Board voted to install a new pool at Camp Christian using up to \$60K McAfee Camp funds.
- Executive Committee began working with Rev. Joan Bell on her transition to the Georgia Region, providing reports, prioritizing current needs, and offering our individual support.

2024 ACTIVITIES

- In a Called Board Meeting in January, the Board voted to approve a revised financial projection for the new pool at Camp Christian that includes a 2-year finance plan with Pamlico Pools.
- Executive Committee voted to approve necessary renovations of Camp Operation Managers' home due to the floor caving in.

- Executive Committee began conversation with College of Regional Minister Search Partner, Rev. John Mobley, to discuss Regional Minister search.
- Executive Committee, Interim Regional Minister, Board members, the Regional Assembly Planning Committee, and the Regional Assembly Nominating Committee continued to work diligently on shoring up plans for the 171st CCINGA Regional Assembly.
- Quarterly Regional Board Meeting was held virtually in February.
- We are excited about our Regional Assembly where we are "Telling Our Stories and Celebrating Hope in our Shared Journey" and the opportunity to join the General Church and our sister regions in the work of transformation of the Church Narrative Project. This includes the Transformative Community Conferencing training presented by Rev. Dr. David Hooker and his staff that will assist us in creating a narrative of a shared future as the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).
- We are excited about further experiencing the skills, abilities, knowledge, and wisdom of our Interim Regional Minister, Rev. Joan Bell-Haynes, as she leads and supports us through this season of transition.
- We are excited about entering the search for a new Regional Minister and we look forward
 to finding new and enhanced creative ways to support the ministry of our clergy and
 congregations and the communal work of our region as we seek to fulfill the Great
 Commission to go out and make disciples of all people (Matt 28.28).

The General Board of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada met in Chicago, IL from April 13-16, 2024. The composition of the General Board includes representatives from the General Units, elected Regional representatives, and congregational representatives elected at the General Assembly.

After we approved the agenda and previous General Board and Administrative Committee minutes, the Rev. Dr. Terri Hord-Owens shared with us her State of the Church address. As we face many of the same headwinds and challenges of shrinking memberships and budgets as other denominations, we are striving to confront them head-on with three major projects which are ongoing.

Implementing GA-2343, a resolution which was passed at the General Assembly in Louisville, is a major part of the Covenant Project as we transform how we equip ourselves for ministry in the future and form a more connected church. One of the major hopes of this effort is greater congregational involvement with our General Assemblies, which will meet digitally every year, with a hybrid meeting every third year. Every congregation will be asked to elect 3 delegates to the Assembly, and these delegates will help to align the work and focus of the General Church and Regions with the needs and ministries of our local congregations. As Rev. Dr. Hord-Owens said in her address, the work of the General Assembly is perpetually ongoing.

The Narrative Project now has 10 Regions who have hosted Storyhours and gone through Transformative Community Conferencing training, and who are continuing to be engaged in listening to who we are as Disciples. We are excited to be beginning that process here in Georgia!

The Proclamation Project seeks to empower those who proclaim the Word of God in its many manifestations across the life of our church. It includes not only Sunday morning sermons but is also about using the various tools and forms of communication we have available in today's world to proclaim the Good News. Cohorts are meeting and forming to continue the work of the Proclamation Project.

ALEX is utilized by enough congregations now, so the system is beginning to be a valuable tool for us to understand who we are. We can explore information in ways that were not possible in the past and gain a better understanding of who we are as a fellowship of congregations and who we serve alongside. Currently, 64% of our congregations have an average worship attendance of 50 or less people each week with 1% of congregations worshipping with more than 351 people.

One of the main parts of our work at the meeting was the reviewing and receiving of reports from the various General Ministries and Regions of the church. There is a cycle of change happening in leadership not only in Georgia, but in multiple General

Ministries and Regions as well. At the same time, there is innovative and creative ministry taking place on our behalf that is being empowered, equipped and led by the Holy Spirit as we answer the call from God in this time.

We concluded our meeting with a sermon by our youngest general board member, the Rev. Jessica Braxton. She inspired us with a message of change and hope, recognizing and naming the work we are all doing in the name of God in our various contexts.

Dear Friends,

Thank you for another year of your support to the Christian Church in Georgia. It is your generosity and investment that keeps our regional work moving forward and serving our churches. We finished 2023 with \$1.195M in endowments and restricted assets for the various ministries of the region. Your hard work has enabled us to create endowments (small and large) for each of our various ministries around the region. The chart below shows year-end income expense for our Region and Camp Christian. In each column is the actual total, a slash, then how much the figure was above or below budgeted expectation. There are draws on endowments and programming budgets that go into the final outcome, so please don't think the math is off between income/expense of JUST the operating budget alone.

I will note that the Women's Ministry finished the year with a \$9,660 surplus. A fuller summary report is available if requested. To answer a couple of questions: first, the extra expenses at camp were mostly due to a very substantial increase in liability insurance; second, the drop in income was due to declining numbers at summer camp and very little usage by Georgia Disciple entities; lastly, as Camp Christian is part of the Region, what financial reserves the region has must cover the deficit for Camp Christian.

For this year's budget, we have approved income and expenses in line with the trends based on recent years. The income will include a \$68,250 draw on our restricted endowments for particular ministries for the following:

Income: \$257,850Expense: \$255,500Net Income: \$2,350

Women's Ministry submitted a balanced budget of \$20,715 in income and expense. Camp has submitted the following:

• Income: \$81,500 (with a \$5,000 draw on the Lavery Fund endowment)

Expense: \$82,440Net Deficit: (\$940)

There will need to be some extensive fundraising in the near future. Camp Christian is now over 60 years old, and the maintenance needs are becoming greater. Just this year between a new pool (required to pass inspection) and renovations to damaged structures, we will be incurring over \$200,000 in maintenance, repair, and replacement expenses. That will leave every single maintenance fund tapped out, and fundraising will be absolutely necessary to keep the facility open and functioning.

The good news in all this is that the financial well-being of our region is presently secure. We continue to pray that our churches and the amazing people of this region continue to give to support the Region's ability to engage in ministry, mission, and work for the whole of the churches in our region. There is so much we can do, and a wealth of untapped potential for doing good for God's Kingdom. I pray we can all share in that vision.

Lastly, I want to thank the team whom I've worked with over the past 4 years: Rev. Daniel Brower, Jenny Miller, Archie Jenkins, Rev. Sheila Hunter, Caroline Grant, and Jim Armstrong. I also want to thank the Region. It has been my privilege and honor to serve as Treasurer from 2011–2018 and 2020–2024. I appreciate your confidence, investment, and hard work.

HEALTHY BOUNDARIES

NOVEMBER 2022 - FEBRUARY 2024

A total of four Healthy Boundaries for Clergy workshops were offered through the collaboration of the Christian Church (DOC) in Georgia and the Southeast Conference of the United Church of Christ. All workshops were provided via Zoom.

Georgia DOC clergy are required to complete Healthy Boundaries training every five years to retain standing; Southeast UCC clergy are required to complete a training every four years. Each workshop consisted of two 3.25-hour sessions, for a total workshop length of 6.5 hours. These workshops (with attendance details for completed workshops) were:

- Healthy Boundaries 101 November 4-5, 2022 (total 11 NACCC requested by National Association of Congregational Christian Churches – NACCC)
- Healthy Boundaries 301- April 28-29, 2023 (total 12 11 DOC, 1 UCC)
- Healthy Boundaries 201 August 18-19, 2023 (total 14 11 DOC, 3 UCC)
- Healthy Boundaries 101 November 3-4, 2024 (total 13 4 DOC, 9 UCC)

Beginning in 2024, the Christian Church in Georgia will be offering Healthy Boundaries workshops independently, as the Southeast Conference United Church of Christ is planning to adopt another curriculum. With continuing preference for virtual instruction (75% of 2023 evaluations prefer virtual), plans are underway for virtual instruction in 2024. Planned dates and workshops for the Christian Church in Georgia are:

- August 23-24, 2024 Healthy Boundaries 101: Fundamentals
- November 1-2, 2024 Healthy Boundaries 301: Money, Sex, & Power

The Communication Commission of the Christian Church in Georgia has shepherded many changes related to communications, beginning in spring 2021, and continuing through early 2024. Since many of these have taken place over several years, a timeline of communication efforts since the April 2021 relaunch of the Communication Commission is provided below.

Regional Communications Timeline

- April 2021 launch of biweekly regional newsletter from regional office, with project leadership by Ja'Lisa Jarvis and Kathy McDowell
- June 2021 <u>www.gadisciples.org</u> redesigned and launched by outside contractor
- November 2021 Communication Commission recommends hiring regional communications staff person, which is included in 2022 budget
- Spring 2022 Communications Commission begins a series of meetings and email discussions regarding a new logo
- September 2022 Amanda Hale hired as Regional Media Communications Coordinator, immediately beginning event and marketing support of the Regional Assembly
- October 2022 –biweekly regional newsletter leadership transferred to Amanda Hale
- Fall 2022-Current Ongoing marketing support of regional events and ministries provided by Amanda Hale, including but not limited to Regional Assembly, Regional Youth Assembly, Disciples Women's Fall Retreat and other events, Camp Christian, Special Offerings, Elders Retreat, and others.
- Fall 2022 "Policy and Process for Regional Newsletter" and "Policy and Process for Regional Obituaries" introduced by Kathy McDowell, reviewed, and implemented over the next 12 months to improve consistency in specific communications
- Winter-Spring 2023 logo project transferred to Amanda Hale
- Spring 2023 "Submit Event Request" (<u>www.gadisciples.org/submit-event-request</u>) and "Submit News" (<u>www.gadisciples.org/submit-news</u>) forms added to <u>www.gadisciples.org</u> to improve process for requesting marketing, registration, and other administrative support of events
- March 2023 Georgia Disciples Facebook Group closed, enabling better monitoring of content and allowing Georgia Disciples Facebook Page to become the official FB marketing presence for the CCinGA.
- May 23, 2023 new logo and rebranding presented and approved by the Regional Board; DOC chalice variations in new logo approved by DOC Office of Communications in June
- August 1, 2023 GA Disciples rebranding launched, including a new banner for FB Page, a new banner, look, and name (The Good News) for the regional newsletter, and a new Instagram page

- October 1, 2023 rebranding completed of all regional communications (website, Constant Contact) to ensure consistent look across all regional communications
- January 2024 Biweekly newsletter schedule shifts to monthly, per recommendation by IRM Rev. Joan Bell-Haynes
- March 2024 Regional branding guidelines distributed to improve consistency across all Regional communications (included as part of this report)

Upgrade Thursdays

A series of virtual events named "Upgrade Thursdays" were held beginning in April 2021 as a way of gathering Georgia Disciples in one-hour, creative, Assembly-style experiences. Fourteen sessions were held in 2021 from April through October. In 2022, the program was hosted for 12 sessions on the fourth Thursdays of January, February, and March, and August, September, and October, with a total of 145 in attendance. In 2023, Upgrade Thursdays was hosted for 12 sessions on the fourth Thursdays of January, February, and March, and August, September, and October, with a total of 161 in attendance. Project leadership by Kathy McDowell in 2021 and 2022, with Kyle Ermoian also providing leadership in 2023.

2023 RECAP

The Reconciliation Commission of Georgia sponsored a Pop-Up Gathering hosted by Ray of Hope Christian Church on February 19 and attended by more than 25 clergy and lay persons from the Region of Georgia. The gathering featured Frances French Hagan, Regional Organizer of Bread for the World, who presented "Advancing Our Understanding About Hunger, Racism, and the Wealth Divide." Participants then engaged in activities and discussion using the Racial Wealth Gap Learning Simulation tool.

2024 PRAR TRAINING DATES

This year, the Reconciliation Commission of Georgia will offer two opportunities for Pro-Reconciliation Anti-Racism training. For those in need of a renewal of PRAR training (having completed one or more units of training previously), two in-person opportunities will be offered in 2024 to fulfill the requirement:

- Completion of both days and all 3 in-person sessions of the Church Narrative Project/Transformative Community Conferencing offered on April 26-27 in conjunction with Regional Assembly
- Completion of one full day of in-person PRAR training led by trainers from the VA Region on Saturday, September 14 (location TBD, most likely a site in Atlanta, GA).

Over the past two to three years the ministry has decreased in numbers due to either heavenly transition or personal reasons. It has been an ongoing process to recruit additional elders so that each individual elder will be more effective in communicating on a consistent basis with assigned churches and not engage in excessive overload due to the high volume of assigned churches to each elder.

We meet monthly to share information about churches contacted plus any and all relevant concerns confronting our local-regional-national church, communities, state, nation, and world. We compile reports shared and pray together for all solicited concerns.

The chairperson (as able to do so) has also served as a representative to the regional minister to events that the regional minister needs assistance with or is unable to attend.

The most recent activity performed by the Eldership was a retreat held in October 2023 at Camp Christian that was open to the whole Georgia region. This event was both virtual and in person. Participants shared that the event was a remarkable success.

OUTDOOR MINISTRY & ADVISORY TEAM (OMAT) Television

OMAT Members, Camp Directors, counselors, and volunteers have been in communication concerning summer camp and needs at camp through zoom meetings, email, and phone calls throughout the last 17 months and will continue going forward.

At the Regional Assembly in November of 2022, we launched the "60 For 60" Campaign to raise funds to celebrate 60 years of camp 2023. Churches and individuals have donated to this fund. As of now the fund has \$19,850. There is still discussion about where to use these funds since there are many needs at camp. We appreciate all who donated to the campaign.

FUTURE CAMP DATES ON REGIONAL WEBSITE

Parents of campers, directors, counselors, and others were given the opportunity to respond and give input into future dates. Prior to the survey, many had let us know they would like to have the camps be in place on the calendar from year to year so that summer plans could be made. Going forward, directors and counselors report late evening on the Sunday of their camp, and campers report the following morning at 10:30 am, and all depart on the last day of the session beginning at 10:30 am. Summer Camp dates for 2024 and 2025 can be found on the regional website calendar at www.gadisciples.org/events; every effort will be made to post camp dates at least two years in advance.

2023 RECAP: WORK DAYS IN MARCH AND JUNE | SUMMER CAMP SUPPORT

- The first was held in March and an exhaust fan on one cabin roof was repaired; benches
 in the fire circle, lakeside and some miscellaneous ones were painted; some benches
 were repaired; Bocce Ball pit put in place; and other miscellaneous cleaning was done.
 Members of Sandy Springs Christian Church sponsored this work day.
- Union Christian Church sent members to work on the fire circle benches.
- During the spring some churches sent members to install and work on screen doors for the cabins.
- In June 2023, prior to the beginning of Summer Camp sessions, the cabins, villas, and cabin area bathhouse were cleaned. Several churches sent members to complete various jobs.
- Beginning in the spring of 2023, churches and individuals participated in both sending items to camp from the Wish List and purchasing items from the Amazon Wish list that were delivered to camp. Many in our region responded, as well as former campers, friends, and counselors.
- Summer 2023 camp sessions began the 2nd Sunday of June and ended the last Saturday
 In June. Those camps were Chi Rho, Junior, Chrysalis, Genesis and CYF Conference. Oasis
 Day camp was held in July. Our theme for the summer was 'Fruitfull Faith: A Spirit-Filled
 Life". Directors, Counselors, CIT's, Keynoters, and campers represented 17 of our
 congregations and sent more than 200 to sessions of camp. We also had visitors from the
 regional board spend at least one day at camp last summer. We had a blessed summer.

- Sandy Springs sponsored a work day in March 2024; repairs were made to cabins, new clotheslines were installed, and some general cleaning took place. They plan to return to do more work in April and maybe May.
- During the first week in June, volunteers will return to clean cabins, director's bungalow, villas, and the bathhouse. Join us. Final date will be published.

WALK THROUGH CAMP

- On March 21, OMAT, some executive team members, and board members joined together
 for a walk-through camp to see the needs of camp. It is a beautiful setting full of God's
 beauty. It was a wonderful day to enjoy meeting and greeting each other and to put our
 eyes on all the projects needing to be completed.
- OMAT meetings continue and fundraising is taking place in churches to prepare for our summer sessions, including donating special water bottles for each camper, director, counselor, and CIT.
- A wish list is available that lists needed items and the Amazon Wish list is also in place.

2024 SUMMER CAMP

- "LINKED BY LOVE" is our theme for 2024 DOC Summer Camp Sessions. The Sessions are fast approaching and we invite you to send your children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and friends to summer camp. OUR MISSION

To create opportunities for Disciples Women throughout the Region of Georgia to serve and connect to God, one another, our church communities, and our world.

OUR VISION

To inspire, lead, & support caring relationships that encourage spiritual growth and leadership among Disciples Women in Georgia while honoring both our diversity and our commonalities.

HIGHLIGHTS OF DISCIPLES WOMEN ACTIVITIES

Disciples Women enjoyed a Fall Retreat at Epworth by the Sea, September 23-25, 2022. Reverend Nancy Oliver led us through a creative exploration of focus Scriptures encouraging us to "Fish or Cut Bait!" Rev. Oliver encouraged approximately 70 women to mobilize, unify, inspire, involve, and act in supporting one another as we fish! Reverend Ann Edmondson added to our collective creative thinking with music that underscored all those attributes as well.

During the 170th Regional Assembly November 11-12, 2022, Disciples Women hosted a very well attended luncheon with Keynoter, Rev. Sylvia Stroy, beautifully proclaiming our theme, "Called as Women to Serve with Joy and Purpose." A special presentation honoring Rev. Betty Brewer-Calvert and her 19 years of service to Georgia's Disciples Women followed our keynote message. Disciples Women from across the Region had an opportunity to share their experiences with Betty with the luncheon attendees, which included Betty's family members.

April showers might bring May flowers but for Disciples Women, April 2023 brought a Spring Conference to St. Andrew Christian Church in Macon, and May 2023 brought a Spring Conference to New Hope Christian Church in Lawrenceville. The theme of both conferences was "Celebrating Women: Honoring HERstory Then and Now." Rev. Nancy Oliver graced both groups with the message and Rev. Ann Haines livened up the luncheons with her signature musical touch.

On August 10, 2023, Disciples Women kicked off a new season of Upgrade Thursdays with the topic, "Disciples Women: Questions for the Future." In gathering ideas from women across the Region, this discussion led to the Fall Retreat Forum Break-out helping the Commission determine and implement activities in the future.

Previous event surveys indicated that Epworth by the Sea should once again serve as our Fall 2023 Retreat location. Disciples Women had a wonderfully successful, spiritually fulfilling, and laughter-filled fellowship of about 70 women, September 22-24, 2023, at "Dancing in the Rain!" Rev. Heather Webb brought thoughtful and thought-provoking messages and Rev. Ann Edmondson provided and led music that got the entire group doing everything from singing, to willingly and gleefully playing kazoo and other percussion instruments. Both of these gifted women greatly enriched our lives and our time together. Along with a break-out group for those who wished to use their artistic talents, there was also a break-out group further explor-

ing the theme's scripture, and a focus group to share ideas for the future of Disciples Women in the Region of Georgia. "Dancing in the Rain" was taken to a whole new level when DW President Dolores Trimiew led an evening of line dancing! Dolores' prep work made it possible for everyone to "line" dance; whether it was on their feet or from chairs. Line dancing will definitely be making a repeat showing in 2024.

Planning is complete for the 171st Regional Assembly Women's Luncheon and the Commission is looking forward to getting to know our Interim Regional Minister and Keynote Speaker, Rev. Joan Bell-Haynes. Rev. Joan will emphasize the Assembly's Church Narrative Project theme through a narrative of her own.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

President Dolores Trimiew and Interim Director of Women's Ministries, Rev. Lainie Jenkins, attended an International Disciples Women Leadership Council meeting via Zoom in January 2023 to learn more about IDWLC's upcoming activities and responsibilities to Regional Women's groups. Rev. Lainie attended the IDWLC and DW Ministries conference in Indianapolis in January 2024. Disciples Women leaders broke into Regional Fellowship groups to begin plans for upcoming Regional Retreats. Rev. Lainie has taken an active role in planning for the SERF (Southeast Regional Fellowship) retreat at Christmount in March, 2026.

Also, encouraged by meeting with other DW Leaders across the U.S. and Canada, and a recent update to IDWLC's Rules and Procedures, the GA DW Commission has completed a review and update of the Commission's Rules and Procedures (last revised in 2010) and will soon have those ready for approval by Georgia's Disciples Women, and subsequent presentation to the Regional Board.

A few additional questions added to our post-retreat and post-conference surveys have enabled the Commission to identify women interested in joining the work of the Commission. Thankfully, the Commission has doubled in size, from four to eight women, increasing our ability to better serve Disciples Women throughout the state. We are grateful to have these faithful women on our Commission: President Dolores Trimiew, Secretary Pam Gunter, Treasurer and Stewardship Chair Sharon Cline, and our Area Coordinators Rev. Ann Edmondson, Carol Backman, Rita Youngblood, Sherrill Gammon, and Rev. Wendy Wyche.

Rev. Lainie and President Dolores have been supporting Georgia Disciples Women in various ways, such as Peachtree Christian Church's Jane Darby Day Luncheon, the Installation of Rev. Valerie Alexander (FCC, Marietta), service projects with FCC Atlanta, Tucker, and an upcoming luncheon at New Hope CC, to name a few. Disciples Women now receive a quarterly newsletter, "Staying Connected," with additional editions for news that "just can't wait!" Staying connected to women throughout Georgia and beyond also keeps our CWF and DW circles aware of our sisters in need of prayer, fellowship opportunities, and events.

Georgia's Disciples Women are looking forward with excitement and renewed energy for all the opportunities before us!
